ROYAL ARCH RESEARCH



MAKING MARKS

As taught from the Mark Master Degree, the first in the Capitular Rite, ancient stonemasons would identify the stones they cut and squared with a unique marking in order to prove their craftsmanship and to acquire their payment. These were often called a "Banker's Mark." Historically, however, most stones would have multiple marks other than just the craftsman's personal identifying one.

Three notable markings are frequently seen on medieval stones, like the one seen here from Lauriston Castle in Edinburg, Scotland, built in the 16th Century. Alongside the Banker's Mark, Assembly Marks were Roman numerals chiseled into the stones to ensure their installation order was numerically accounted for and correct. In the above image, we can see this stone was the thirteenth within its' sequence. Lastly, "Quarry Marks" often identified the quarry the stone yielded from, the stones' composition, and sometimes were used to rate the stone quality. As seen in the example, "FT" likely are the initials of the quarry that it came from.






PRESERVING OUR PASTS

V. E. BARRY GILLESPIE, PGHP

Barry Gillespie (1802-1851) served as the <u>first Most Excellent Grand High Priest of</u> the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of the <u>Republic of Texas</u> from 1841 to 1843. He became a Freemason in Lafayette Lodge No. 60 in Tennessee and later joined Matagorda Lodge. He served as the Most Excellent High Priest of Lone Star Chapter No. 3 in Austin, TX before the convention that formally established the Grand Chapter of the Republic of Texas. He later served as Most Worshipful Grand Master of Texas Masons in 1845. The photo seen here has been colorized to show what life might have looked like. He rests in Brenham, TX at <u>Prairie Lea Cemetery</u>.

EXPLORING EXODUS IDENTIFYING THE TWELVE STONES

In the Book of Exodus, we are introduced to Aaron's Breastplate, which is also known as the Breastplate of Judgement. Aaron wore this breastplate which had twelve stones on it representing the twelve tribes of Israel. It was meant to remind him of his obligations not only to God, but also to the people. This breastplate is the symbol used for Past High Priests, and it bears 12 precious stones that are not explained esoterically. Nearly every translation lists different stones, some of which have since been renamed. The Masonic Heirloom Bible will be the version used for the next 12 months!





SARDIUS

Sardius, the first stone of the first row, comes from the Greek word Sardios meaning "stone." It is a precious stone that anciently was confused as a ruby due the similar color in raw form. In gemology, it is modernly called "Carnelian." When polished, it displays a translucent and fine-grained variety.

- GET TO KNOW YOUR COMMITTEES -



This committee examines, considers, and reports conclusions on the proper form and legality on all By-Laws and Amendments of subordinate chapters. This allows the Grand Royal Arch Chapter to make certain all constituent chapters are within legal compliance when determining their own governing rules. This termed committee has five seats with one that rolls off every year. The current Chairman is Companion Chris Bates.



CREDENTIALS

This committee receives and examines the credentials of any Companion who wishes to attend the Grand Annual Convocation. Additionally, they are tasked to maintain an accurate listing of all current and past Grand Officers, Representatives of other Grand Jurisdictions, also with the proper chapter name and number. Furthermore, they require each proxy from a chapter to have a written commission certifying his election as such by said chapter in order to represent their ballots at the Grand Annual Convocation. Lastly, they must present a partial report at the earliest convenience of the opening of every Grand Session to confirm guorum and announce the amount of votes present. This committee is not a termed committee and is selected fully every year by the Grand High Priest. It has five seats. The current Chairman is Nelson Dunn.
