FROM THE GRAND ORATOR'S SCROLL

<u>Japheth</u>, the third son of Noah, is the final character from the Great Flood we will highlight. He, like his father and brothers, survived in the Ark and helped to repopulate the world. Having seven sons with his wife after the Great Flood, he is credited as the ancestor of the Persians, Greeks, Romans, Macedonians, and various other parts of Europe and Asia. Unlike Ham, he and Shem were blessed by Noah. From this blessing, Japheth's territory was extended. As history unfolds, the populations tied to him developed large empires and eventually travel westward to the Americas. Truly, Japheth's territory was extended and reaches across the world today.

ROYAL ARCH RESEARCH



Of the more than 16,000 Texas Historical Markers, seven reference Royal Arch Masonry. Five mark structures, one a cemetery, and one honors an individual – *Companion Andrew Jackson McGown* (1816–1870) – at his burial site.

McGown was a Presbyterian minister and newspaper editor who served in the Texas Army and fought at the Battle of San Jacinto. He was tasked with recruiting ministers and raising funds for a statewide church newspaper. His efforts grew the number of Presbyterian clergy in Texas from about ten in 1844 to nearly seventy by 1852. After initial publishing attempts failed, he launched *The Texas Presbyterian* himself on November 3, 1846, in Victoria—the first regularly issued English-language church newspaper based in Texas. His grave is located in Glenwood Cemetery in Crockett, Texas.

INTERNET

The Committee on Internet is responsible for the development, regulation, and promotion of capitular activities through webpages, social media usage, and other online platforms as this Grand Chapter continues to evolve in an increasingly digital world. This Committee has five seats and is fully selected by the Grand High Priest every year. The current Chairman is E:. Companion Justin Winch.



The Committee on Investments shall be composed of members who are experienced in financial investments as a result of substantial time (not less than five years) spent as a professional in the field of financial management and investments. The Committee shall prepare for presentation to each joint session with the Grand Chapter Trustees its recommendation as to how monies in the General Fund, Endowed Membership Fund, and in all funds of this Grand Chapter shall be prudently invested for the maximum benefit to this Grand Chapter. They also shall meet each calendar quarter in joint session, exchange information pertinent to the investments. Any changes or implementation of investment policies and procedures shall require a combined majority approval of the Trustees and members of the Committee. This Committee has five seats with one member rolling off every year. The current Chairman is Right Excellent Companion Scott Stanton.




PRESERVING OUR PASTS

V .: E .: ZACHARIAH ELLIS COOMBES, PGHP

Zachariah Ellis Coombes (1833-1895) affiliated with Dallas Chapter No. 47 on December 17, 1855, where he would serve as High Priest twice (1870 & 1875). He later served as the thirtieth Most Excellent Grand High Priest in 1880. Professionally, he made a career as a teacher, lawyer, state legislator, and soldier. Coombes was the headmaster of a school on the Brazos Indian Reservation in Young County. In 1862 he entered the Confederate Army and was later promoted to Captain. That summer, he was elected County Judge of Dallas County in the June 1866 election. By the 1870s, he actively and successfully practiced law. He was later elected a member of the Texas State House of Representatives in 1885. As the presiding Grand Master, he laid the 12,000-pound cornerstone of the Texas State Capitol in Austin in 1885, on the 49th anniversary of Texas independence.

EXPLORING EXODUS IDENTIFYING THE TWELVE STONES

In the Book of Exodus, we are introduced to Aaron's Breastplate, which is also known as the Breastplate of Judgement. Aaron wore this breastplate which had twelve stones on it representing the twelve tribes of Israel. It was meant to remind him of his obligations not only to God, but also to the people. This breastplate is the symbol used for Past High Priests, and it bears 12 precious stones that are not explained esoterically. Nearly every translation is different and some stones have since been renamed. The Masonic Heirloom Bible will be the version used for the remainder of this segment!






SAPPHIRE

Sapphire is the second stone of the second row of the Breastplate. The celestial blue color has always symbolized heaven and attracted divine favor and wise judgment which made it common for clergy to wear. The name is derived from the Latin word sapphirus, itself from the Greek word sappheiros, which referred to lapis lazuli - a natural blue toned metamorphic rock. Ancient Persians and Babylonians believed the world rested on a giant sapphire due to the color of the oceans and the sky.
